They must have been amazed as well as terrified – as we would have been. The main points of Kamran's sermon on Sunday is given below. There are countless images of this scene. Royal Foundation of St Katharine's Retreat: Last week I went on a retreat for two days at the Royal Foundation of St Katharine's, Limehouse. What an oasis of peace it was in the middle of such a busy, noisy part of London. The theme of the retreat was "Nazareth: The Way of the Heart". It was organized by the Revd Richard Carter and his team from St Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Companions of Nazareth in preparation for Lent. Transfiguration: Points from Kamran's Sermon Standing on the shoulders of Giants

While in Theological college, I read a phrase, "Standing on the shoulders of Giants", which means using the understanding gained by major thinkers who have gone before in order to make intellectual progress". This metaphor is quite ancient. John of Salisbury, one of the 12th century theologians and author used a version of the phrase in Latin in 1159. "We are like dwarfs sitting on the shoulders of giants. We see more, and things that are more distant, than they did, not because our sight is superior or because we are taller than they, but because they raise us up, and by their great stature add to ours." I feel the whenever the bible talks about the mountain top experience, it is bit like standing on the shoulders of giants.

I firmly believe that God's presence is everywhere. But, in the Bible, there are a few passages where The divine presence is witnessed on or around a mountain. That pattern held true for the likes of Moses, Elijah, and Jesus. God called Moses to Mt. Sinai and gave him the 10 Commandments.

The prophet Elijah had his share of mountaintop moments as well. Remember, it was on the top of Mt. Horeb, Elijah experience God's presence in the sounds of silence. Jesus, in Matthew 4 -7, delivers the greatest sermon of all times, "The Sermon on the Mount".

Jesus is once again climbing a mountain with his three closest disciples, Peter, James, and John. The background of the passage is that Jesus in previous paragraph 8:31 predicted about his death and

suffering to his disciples, which causes them great distress.

On the mountain, Jesus was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with Jesus. His garments became radiant and exceedingly white, shining, so it was a spiritual state.

So what is happening there? And why is Jesus' transfiguration experience important for his disciples



and also for me and you.

First Reason

Jesus gives these frighten men a glimpse of the future. In previous chapters, three times Jesus predicted his death, which had cause a great distress in the disciples. And now Jesus knows that he is heading to Jerusalem where he will be rejected and suffer the cross. But he doesn't want to leave them wondering what is the future of Jesus, and his mission. But before any of this happened, Jesus is trying to show his disciples what lies beyond the cross. By leading them to the mountain Experience he was showing them that he will be exalted in glory. It is a great hope all of us too. The Christ you serve, the kingdom you are investing your life in, is not some lost cause, it is not going to dwindle away into the failure. You are the part of the kingdom that will never end Disciples needed to see this glimpse of future. Before they face the cross, they need to see the glory. We who are serving in this parish, in this country, people who are serving in different parts of Europe and in whole world need to see this vision

When you see Jesus rejected, when you hear people says that we don't want to know Jesus, or the bible is irrelevant, don't ever think that is the end. Be assured that this is not the end, because the end will begin with Jesus' glory.

Second reason

In addition, Jesus gives his disciples and all of us a hope, a living hope; Hope of resurrection. Seeing Moses and Elijah is the evidence of resurrection.

The disciples not only seeing the glory of Jesus, but now they are seeing two men sharing this glory with Christ. That is the promise of the bible, after this life, we will be sharing the glory of Son Paul in 2 Thessalonian 2:14. Through the gospel God has called you so you may share the glory of Jesus Christ.

Apostle John who was there at the mountain recall that event later in his letter

1 John 3:2. When we will see him we will be like him for we will see him as he is.

Me and you will be sharing the glory of Jesus Christ.

In the transfiguration, Jesus let his disciples see a glimpse of his future glory. Their sadness was overcome with the joy.

Third reason

Finally, in transfiguration, disciples, begin to realise the true identity of Jesus.

They witnessed Jesus' human and divine natures, humanity meets divinity. The presence of God is strongly realized and felt on Earth. 2 Peter 1:16. Peter in our first reading confirm when he says that, "We had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." "We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain". There is something wonderful going on here. Notice when cloud comes and envelope the disciples, they react as any human being would react in that situation, in the presence of God. They are terrified. Which is a natural human reaction? In Exodus 19, when Moses encountered God on the mountain, the bible tells us that Moses and all people were trembling with fear. At the transfiguration, when disciple encounter God's presence, they couldn't stand and they fell with their faces to ground, as the presence of God passes over them. Through Christ, we can stand in the presence of God. Jesus came to these terrified disciples and touched them and he said get up, don't be afraid.

Don't you think they must have feel profoundly grateful that Jesus was with them when they enter in the presence of God? In all the terror of the presence of this holy God, Jesus came and touched them and says to them "Don't be afraid".

The day will come for every one of us in this church, when we will enter in the presence of God and this story tells us something very import about the future, that if Jesus is with you, you will be able to stand in the presence of God with nothing to fear,

The question to think about is, "If that is the future, how should you prepare for it in living today?"



World Day of Prayer – Friday 3rd March at 2.00pm - Sheila





Sunday School Voices





More Suggestions for Reading in Lent

"The Hour is Come: Passion in Real Time" Andrew Nunn Dean of Southwark Cathedral.

In Christ's Passion in real time, Andrew Nunn takes the reader through the events that Jesus experienced through the last week of his life with his disciples and followers. The book is divided into chapters each with an account of what takes place, the timing, a reflection and prayer. It is an excellent book to read from the start of Lent, through to the end, taking the reader through the long journey. It is expressively and clearly written in Andrew Nunn's engaging style.

Meeting God in Matthew

Elaine Storkey

Elaine Storkey takes us into Matthew's Gospel with fresh eyes, teaching us about the context in which it was written and how how Matthew helps us understand more about Jesus, his life and teaching. Each chapter contains questions and reflections for the reader to think about and discuss independently and/or with others.

Sleepers Wake: Getting Serious About Climate Change

Nicholas Holtam, former Bishop of Salisbury.

While this book was originally written for Advent, it is highly suitable for Lent. Bishop Holtam invites the reader to take very seriously the issues of Climate Change. He does not do so in a didactic way but through scripture, art, his personal recollections of nature and how precious it is, as we are. He talks of our unity and uniqueness with all Creation — our unbreakable bond — and asks us some serious questions. Each chapter contains a prayer and an opportunity for meditation.

Journaling the Psalms by Paula Gooder

Lay Canon of St Paul's Cathedral

This is for those of you who like the psalms and/or are intrigued by them. It is more of a journal to be kept by the reader than a straight-through read. It is one in which Paula takes us through 15 of her favourite psalms. Each chapter, devoted to one psalm, contains its history and context, with an invitation to ponder on it for ourselves, enjoying the expressive language, and finding what has meanings for us. At the end of each chapter there is an opportunity to mull over the questions given and to write down on the blank page given, any thoughts and insights that arise
