sides of the bar", as it were, the support he gave to prisoners and his transformation which ended in his getting ordained and becoming a prison chaplain.

Johnathan Aitken's Story: Prisoner and Redemption - Sally

The Revd Jonathan Aitken was invited to give the "Donald Barnes Memorial Lecture" last Wednesday at, St Peter's Church, Belsize Square, where Donald was vicar for 17 years. A good number of people came, and it was lovely to be able to greet them. I am not sure what any of us expected, many of us having been old enough to remember this event in his life in 1999 and what took place.

In fact, it was a remarkable story told with clarity, honesty, and humility, with sometimes self-deprecating humour, of the journey from being a high-profile cabinet minister, who goes to jail in disgrace, to finding redemption through service while he was in prison helping prisoners

and developing a deepening Faith through prayer. He described the slow, painful acceptance of his situation, to transformation through the friendship and support he gave to the prisoners as well as receiving the same from them. It was a kind of a reciprocal action that made a deep impression on all involved in different ways. After his initial fear was overcome about what they might do to him, the inmates found he would willingly support them by reading and replying to their letters as well as listening to their stories. He stressed the importance of listening. At the beginning of his sentence, he was approached by one inmate who asked him to help with a letter he had received but could not read or reply as he could not write. Jonathan did both, calling on his many years of experience as an MP to contact the right people over a technical issue. Having done this, his fame spread, and many inmates came to him for help to write all kinds of letters. At the same time, he was praying a great deal and reflecting about his developing Faith with an awareness of how he had lived his life. Going into prison someone had handed him a copy of psalm 130 which is often called the prisoners prayer (Out of the depths I cry to you oh Lord; Hear my my voice; Let you ears be attentive to my cry for mercy) and that, with other psalms particularly psalm 139, had a deep effect on him. One or two inmates were intrigued about his praying and questioned him about it. Without being heavy, he invited them to pray with him which some did quite regularly in his tiny cell and numbers grew.

His made the point that transformation actually began with his acceptance of his guilt and the justness of his sentence. Then, by looking forward to a better future based on his deepening faith he was helped through his difficult early days in prison. He did not look backwards but forwards with hope and through the support he gave to his in-mate friends and, I also think listening to him, by the way they helped him and his changing views. He found much consolation in prayer as well as the often-amusing conversations he had with one of his particular cell mates who offered him a gift of pornographic magazines as a thanks from the other inmates! When he declined them and explained why, they were intrigued but interested and they listened. He told us that one third of prisoners are illiterate so he provided what help he could by reading their letters and helping them with the responses, which he also wrote in reply.

The help he provided was clearly an uplifting experience for him and the other prisoners who had many needs. It was clear that his faith was working on him in ways I do not think he fully understood at the time. When he completed his sentence and was released, he followed up his reflections and the experiences he had had in prison by taking a theology degree. He had no intention of becoming a priest - the thought of which he kept rejecting. When it became clear to him that he really did have a calling, which he had to accept, he started by becoming a voluntary worker in prisons and, after ordination, became a chaplain. (I have many friends, now priests, who struggled with the idea of becoming ordained and rejected it for many years, but in the end just gave in because the struggle to turn their backs became too much) This clearly happened to Jonathan.

His story was engrossing. There was no hint of anger and resentment about his own past misdeeds and actions. Instead, he started with acceptance of his guilt and the sentence he was given. One message that came through clearly was not to dwell on the past, if you do it drags you and everyone down; the important thing is what matters to you today and how you look forward with hope and Faith to the future. It struck those listening of the power of faith, prayer, and forgiveness to change lives; that the redemption we are offered, if we accept it, brings about change and, can, as his life has, help us to embark on a remarkable and unplanned journey leading to fresh ways of being.
