Maundy Thursday Asian Service

An inspiring Asian worshipping service **RAHE CALVARY** (the Journey to the Calvary) held on Maundy Thursday evening. Many Asian worshiper from different parts of London attended and contributed to the service.











A moving **Stations of the Cross** was held on Good Friday when we processed round the church with different members of the congregation telling the story of each one. Our children were marvelous. They joined in with the telling and each took it in turns to carry the cross as we went round. As we stopped, prayed and



meditated by each Station, it brought home the number of different agonies Christ went through on our behalf at each stage along the road with those who shared them with him; Agonies that so many of us experience in our lives in different ways and can identify with. It was a profound experience reflecting on the fact that he felt and suffered each one of them for us.

We are so fortunate to have the full set of exquisitely crafted stations, fourteen in all, (just some of which are pictured below) made by skilled carpenters in Italy at the request of Anita's father, Mac, in memory of his much loved wife, Devi. Mav and Devi were long term and faithful members of our church, because of that they have a special significance for us as they are remembered with love.









Good Friday Passion Story: At 10.00am we gathered for the Good Friday Service which included the telling of the Passion from St John's Gospel. The whole story was read and led by Alex as the narrator, with each character played by different members of the congregation. It was both memorable and moving. A sense of peace and silence was maintained afterwards in the thought of the cruel happenings of this day.

The Corrymeela Community

The Corrymeela Community was founded in 1965. It is an organisation devoted to Reconciliation in Northern Ireland and throughout the World. It seeks to support individuals and communities who suffered through the violence and divisions of the Northern Irish conflict, which to an extent still carries on today, albeit not so strongly, but the divisions and violence intermittently continue. The Community works alongside people from youth and school groups to family and community organizations, faith communities and political parties. They run group sessions, by, supporting mothers who have struggled to parent their young people in the face of challenges such as drugs and para—militarism in West Belfast. They do this by using dialogue, experiential play, art, storytelling, mealtimes and shared community to help groups embrace difference and learn how to have difficult conversations. They support around 7,500 people, who are mainly from marginalised communities, to explore difference and discover ways to live well together. Their work is not so unlike the peace and reconciliation work that takes place in Coventry Cathedral.

How much they are still needed is evident from the examples they talk about of violence, intimidation and the resultant breakdown of people's mental and physical health. They have developed onwards, not just to help the insecure peace and reconciliation in N I, but also to support different countries where such help is badly needed. I have heard leaders of the Community talk about their work over more years that I care to remember and the examples they give of why it is necessary. I was invited to a conference in Belfast in 2002, when I was still working, the topic of which was, "Working with Children Living in Violence". I met, mostly,



women from across the world, who were doing just that, such remarkable and courageous people. The stories they told about what action they took and how they tried to protect the children and their families, has stayed long in my mind. What made a deep impression on me, was hearing from the young people in NI and their experiences of living in the terror of the bombs and threats from divided groups, the attacks on school children, the knee capping of young men and the suicides. How they were persistently and bravely working for peace amidst all this was incredible – many were the age of my own teenage children. Listening to them, and what they had been through, was a salutary experience to be reminded that all this was all happening approximately 444 kilometers away from our shores.

Latterly, Pádraig Ó Tuama, one of the leaders of the community, a poet and theologian, has written and published a book of Daily Prayer, by Canterbury Press. In the book he offers new insights into living a life of reconciliation, along with other themes that include living truthfully in community, sharing meals, arguments and hope at the same table. I have ordered a copy and will review it in case you might like to borrow or purchase one. How badly we need the efforts and determined work of Communities such as this in our troubled times. Please pray for them and for peace that it may miraculously come upon all areas of conflict and for children and young people caught up in violence of any kind.
