**Listening to God**: During the Sunday service, Kamran reminded us that we will be approaching Lent in the next few weeks, a season which seems to be upon us very quickly this year having just celebrated Christmas. However, the theme for the next few Sundays will be, "Listening to God"; especially noticing how we hear God through other people with whom we come in contact. He emphasized how God speaks to us in many different ways, in a variety of circumstances and through many different people, whoever they are, so we always need to be listening and aware.

**Listening to God through other people:** We started off with Jenny who gave a moving Testament about her Father who, while suffering from Alzheimer's, unexpectedly stood up at a function and spoke to those present, clearly and lucidly. Jenny has written about it for the newsletter so it can be shared with those who were not present and remind those of us who were there of what he said.

**Meditation in a troubled world:** In his intercessions on Sunday, Tony talked of the importance of silence in prayer and meditation and to listen to what God might be saying to us. He gave us time to do just that. It was indeed peaceful and meditative and maybe something we need to do more of. He read psalm 8.



As there is so much strife and warfare taking place at the moment, at so many levels, and while we are all praying constantly for peace and Justice, it carries on regardless. There is a great deal of discussion about our need to be peaceful in ourselves and towards each other and to take the practice of mediation seriously to set a background of peace for the world as well as ourselves.

Below is a synopsis of some writings taken from Richard Rohr's Daily Meditations that a number of us receive each day and ponder on. Richard is a Roman Catholic Franciscan priest, Ecumenicist, writer on spirituality based in New Mexico. He founded "The Centre for Action and Contemplation" and has a world-wide following through his and his teams daily writings on prayer and especially the importance of Love. You might find these snippets helpful and thought provoking.

**The wisdom of the Holy Spirit:** Following on from "Meditation in a troubled world", these wise words printed below were recently spoken by Pope Francis who talks about the "Wisdom of the Holy Spirit". He in his wisdom and compassion echoes what so many others of different denominations and Faiths are saying and speaking with one voice.

**Bible Study:** As we are approaching Lent, Kamran would like to hear from you if you are interested in joining in with some Bible Study sessions to take place during the 6 weeks of Lent. Please let him know.

**Future Events – Ideas:** It has been suggested it would be a good idea if we, as a church family, planned a variety of events, paced throughout the year, that we could join in together. These ideas arose from our Wednesday morning coffee group. There are many things we could do and would like to hear what you think. Could you give it a thought and let Kamran know, talk about it over Sunday coffee or write ideas down on a paper provided on the table at the side of the church. We need to share our ideas.

**Baptism/Confirmation classes:** Kamran is starting classes soon for those wishing to be confirmed. Please let him know if you, or any member of your family, would like to be confirmed. Now we have a newly appointed Bishop of Edmonton (Revd Canon Dr Anderson Jeremiah) it will be so great to have him confirm members of our church family.

# Listening to God through other people - Jenny

This is a shortened version of the testimony I shared in Sunday's service, which I hope was an encouragement to those who heard it – and will encourage those who are reading this!

I described something that had happened more than 15 years ago but which left a huge impression on me and is still talked about by some of those who were there.

I was leading an informal Christmas service at my previous church and was thrilled that my parents were able to be there. I started by referring to a wedding I'd been to recently, where the bride's sister had started the prayers with "Wow, God!". I wondered whether we'd lost the "wow" factor in our approach to Christmas, and hoped that this service might help us recover it. Little did I know!

I'd asked the oldest member of our congregation, Margot, who was 95, to say a few words about how her attitude to Christmas had changed over the years. She spoke beautifully and movingly about her experience of Christmas at different times in her life, and some of the themes she found particularly important.

After that I opened the floor to anyone who wanted to comment on what had just been said, or to develop it – I hadn't planned to do this, but it just seemed like a good idea at the time. To my enormous consternation Dad immediately stood up and began to speak. My consternation was enormous because he was well into dementia, unable to concentrate or follow what was going on, had lost much of his memory, and was altogether rather unpredictable.

What he said was astonishing in its coherence, relevance and authority. He began by introducing himself as a visitor who only knew a small number of those present. He commented on what Margot had talked about, saying it was clear the Holy Spirit had been at work in her life, and she was an example of how God could work in all kinds of people, of any age. He said that he'd been involved in church all his life, and that going to church was important, but what was even more important was how we behaved the rest of the time. We have always to be open to the working and guidance of the Holy Spirit: we need his presence in our lives all the time. It doesn't matter if we don't like people or don't get on with them, we have to follow the leading of the Spirit regardless.



He continued in this vein for 3-4 minutes (I guess, I was too stunned to be aware of time), without any hesitation, repetition, or deviation, before concluding and sitting down. I was distinctly wobbly by then, but got through the rest of the service, just!

Afterwards, a couple of people came up to me to say how encouraged they'd been by what Dad had said. I explained about his dementia, and they were amazed. This was not Dad speaking – it couldn't have been - but the Holy Spirit using him prophetically to speak some important truths into our church. The most significant was the urging to follow the Spirit's leading whether we like people or not – that was unbelievably relevant to our context, and there was no way he could have known that.

As well as being a really important moment for that church, this was a huge learning experience for me personally. God can speak through anyone, irrespective of their age, health, capabilities, or anything else and I hadn't got to write Dad off just because he had dementia. He'd always been a gifted teacher and public speaker and God was clearly using those gifts even in the depths of his decline. Dad was a lifelong follower of Jesus, and even though his human relationships had become very difficult, his relationship with God was absolutely rock solid. Mum was still taking him to their church small group and I knew that his prayers in those meetings were very powerful. He would also read the lesson in church with clarity and authority. I remember too that he would give thanks before meals with profound prayer All of that was, and remains, a tremendous reassurance and encouragement.

Listening to God through other people isn't only a matter of listening to the 'obvious' voices, but as Kamran said being alert to him speaking through the unexpected ones as well. Wow, God!!



# The wisdom of the Holy Spirit alive in Pope Francis:

"You can have flaws, be anxious and even be angry, but don't forget that your life is the greatest business in the world. Only you can stop it from failure. You are appreciated, admired and loved by many. Remember that being happy is not having a sky without storms, a road without accidents, a job without effort, relationships without disappointments.

"Being happy is to stop feeling a victim and become the author of your own destiny. It's going through deserts, but being able to find an oasis deep in your soul. It's to thank God every morning for the miracle of life. It's kissing your children, cuddling your parents, having poetic moments with your friends, even when they hurt us.

"To be happy is to let live the creature that lives in each of us, free, joyful and simple. It's having maturity to be able to say: "I made mistakes". Having the courage to say "I'm sorry". It's having a sensitivity to say "I need you". Is having the ability to say "I love you". May your life become a garden of opportunities for happiness... that in spring I can be a lover of joy and in winter a lover of wisdom.

"And when you make a mistake, start over. Because only then will you fall in love with life. You will find that being happy doesn't mean having a perfect life. But she uses tears to irrigate tolerance. Use your defeats



to train your patience.

"Use your mistakes with the serenity of the sculptor. Use pain to tune into pleasure. Use obstacles to open the windows of intelligence. Never give up ... Above all, never give up on the people that love you. Never give up on happiness, because life is an amazing show. ".

# Jesus on the Margins - Anderson Jeremiah\*

Online event premiered on YouTube and then available on catch-up.

Anderson Jeremiah and Paula Gooder talk about Jesus in the Bible, in history, and in our lives. They explore his suffering, death and resurrection, how much stories and images of him matter, and how we can live as disciples of Jesus today. We also hear something of Anderson's own faith story, his influences in Black, Dalit and Liberation Theologies, and his journey from Dalit background in South India to his life as a priest and scholar in the UK today.

The Revd Canon Dr Anderson Jeremiah takes up the role of Bishop of Edmonton in the diocese of London from spring 2024. Previous to this, at Lancaster University he has been Senior Lecturer and Associate Dean (Equality, Diversity, Inclusion and People) in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences while serving as associate priest of St Paul's, Scotforth, in the diocese of Blackburn.

Dr Paula Gooder is Canon Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral, a distinguished New Testament scholar and the author of numerous popular and academic books.
